A one-day state-level seminar titled "Indian/Indigenous Knowledge System: Exploring Darjeeling Knowledge System" was organized by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of Darjeeling Government College on 28th May 2025. The event was held at Lalita Ahmed Rai Hall and aimed to explore and preserve the diverse indigenous knowledge systems prevalent in the Darjeeling region.

Inaugural Session

The seminar was inaugurated by Dr. Partha Ganguly, whose inspiring presence set the tone for the day's proceedings. The program was attended by respected Officer-in-Charge, Dr. Prajjawal C. Dr. Tilak Chatterjee, Principal of Bankim Sardar College, South 24 Parganas, elaborated on sustainable methods of documentation and the potential of indigenous systems in modern academic and developmental paradigms. The event brought attention to the under-researched yet vital traditional practices and philosophies of communities such as the Lepchas, Tibetans, Rais, Limbus, Tamangs, and Newars. He interacted with the participants on key aspects of indigenous knowledge and its integration into mainstream academia.
